RULE Use the lower wordsign for "in" wherever the word it represents occurs provided that any sequence in which it occurs includes a sign with an upper dot.

Below are 4 examples using the same word.

[Groupsign "in" can be used since the Italic Word Indicator contains an upper dot.]

[Groupsign "in" can be used since the sequence contains an upper dot.]

bein' **∷ <mark>•∷ ∷</mark>** ∷

[Groupsign "in" cannot be used since the sequence doesn't contain an upper dot.]

"bein" [Wait a minute, this example is confusing. The Lower Sign Rule 10.6.10 will explain everything.]

Any type of quotation mark which may be present is considered to have only lower dots. In the example, the double quotation marks, containing dots in the upper cell, are still quotation marks.
