## Weekly Dose the Reader's Perspective

Here are 4 ways a braille reader will determine the meaning of a braille sign.

- 1. Spacing
- 2. Applying the Standing Alone rule (e.g. alphabetic wordsigns)
  - [For example: An alphabetic wordsign MUST stand alone, otherwise it would be misread as a letter for word.]
- 3. Its position in relation to other signs (e.g. opening nonspecific quotation mark, line indicator, final-letter groupsigns)
- 4. By the mode in effect (e.g. digits, arrow indicator) [For example, a phone number containing hyphens, the numeric indicator is used after the hyphen to maintain numeric mode.]
