WEEKLY DOSE OF BRAILLE Format Updates for fully Capitalized Headings and Addresses

Question 1: How do I use my capitals indicators for a fully capitalize address shown in print?

Answer: I have an answer for you about the fully capitalized addresses at last! Here is the recommendation from a top UEB expert: Consider each line as a text element in this case. Precede each line with the cap passage indicator, putting it before the number at the beginning of the second line because it is continuing an ongoing passage. (If the passage started on that line, the indicator would be placed before CHERRY.) Place the cap terminator after IL, before the zip code, in the third line.

Question: How do I use the capitalized passage indicator for more than one heading that are in consecutive order, where do I terminate?

Answer: Each text element is capitalized separately.

Rule: 8.5.6 When transcribing a capitalized passage which extends over more than one text element and where the text elements do not constitute a continuous passage (e.g.: a series of headings), each text element is capitalized separately.

I know we had discussed that a passage is to keep going and going until you terminate, this is true, however, from a braille reader's perspective it is best to differentiate headings as a separate text element.
