Now apply the rule below, the lower wordsign is not used when in contact with any punctuation sign, including the hyphen and dash, which has <u>only lower dots</u>, even when in contact with the Italic Typeform Word Indicator. (Below, the word, *his* is next to a question mark which would be all lower dots so you would NOT contract the word *his*.)

Remember, Typeform indicators decide the style of a letter, word, or passage to reflect what is shown in print; however, punctuation is part of the structure of the sentence.
