

Capitalized Passage and Letter-Sequence

RULE A capitalized letter or letters-sequence placed adjacent to the beginning or end of a capitalized passage is **not necessarily considered to be part of the passage**, especially if it is separated from the passage by a space or punctuation.

Examples:

"... at 11:00 AM"—MARKHAM ECONOMIST AND SUN
